

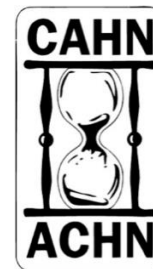

The United Church of Canada in Chongqing, China: Dr. Alexander Stewart Allen's Medical Mission, 1929-1951

Nicole Barnes (Duke University)

In 1929, Dr. Alexander Stewart Allen (1899-1992) traveled from his homeland of Ontario to Sichuan, China to serve as a medical missionary representing the United Church of Canada. This talk includes a brief overview of Dr. Allen's mission work and focuses on his service in Chongqing during its years as China's wartime capital. In a time of great hardship and danger, Dr. Allen (known locally by his Chinese name Liang Zhenglun) worked tirelessly to lead Chongqing's largest mission hospital. For many years, he was the only foreigner on staff, and from October 1937 he worked with a Chinese superintendent of nurses. The Canadian Mission Hospital (CMH) also operated one of the city's largest nursing schools whose graduates not only staffed the hospital but also did public health work in schools, factories and clinics throughout Chongqing. The work of Dr. Allen and CMH nurses exemplifies this year's conference theme of "Care in Conflict."

Nicole Elizabeth Barnes received her PhD from the University of California, Irvine in 2012 and is currently Andrew W. Mellon Assistant Professor in the Departments of History and Gender, Sexuality and Feminist Studies at Duke University. Her first book, *Intimate Communities: Wartime Healthcare and the Birth of Modern China, 1937-1945* was published by the University of California Press in 2018 and in 2019 it received the Joan Kelly Memorial Prize from the American Historical Association.

Vera Roberts' Vision: Continuing Support for Northern Nursing Historical Research

Organizers: Geertje Boschma (University of British Columbia) and Lesley McBain (University of Saskatchewan)

The purpose of the Vera Roberts Endowment is to fund research and publications on the history of outpost nursing in Canada with a priority on Canadian circumpolar regions (North of the 60th parallel). This panel is designed to highlight Vera Roberts' vision and make visible the work and possibilities she created by entrusting CAHN-ACHN with the opportunity to provide enduring support to Northern Nursing History Research. To date, the Endowment has funded a wide range of topics that explore the tensions and conflicts of northern nursing from a historical perspective. Yet many aspects of northern nursing are in need of further investigation, for which Vera Roberts endowment funds are available. We wish to bring to light some of the work to date and to underscore the importance of historical research on the development and provision of health care services in Canada's north. Ongoing challenges of providing health care services to Northern residents remain, with persistent and new questions to examine. Therefore, the presentations in this panel session will draw on several recent projects related to the history of northern nursing to promote the range of opportunities supported by the Vera Roberts Award.

The Special Session Panel will begin with a brief overview of the Vera Roberts' vision, followed by three presentations of 15 minutes each and a general discussion with the audience of ways to encourage historical research in this area.

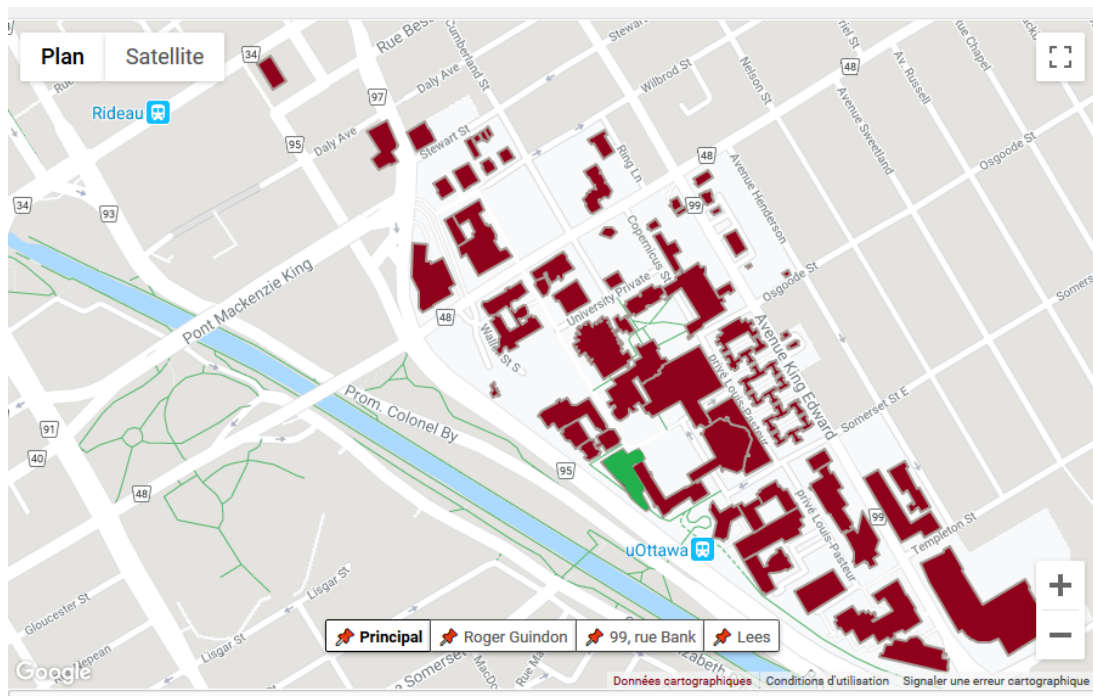

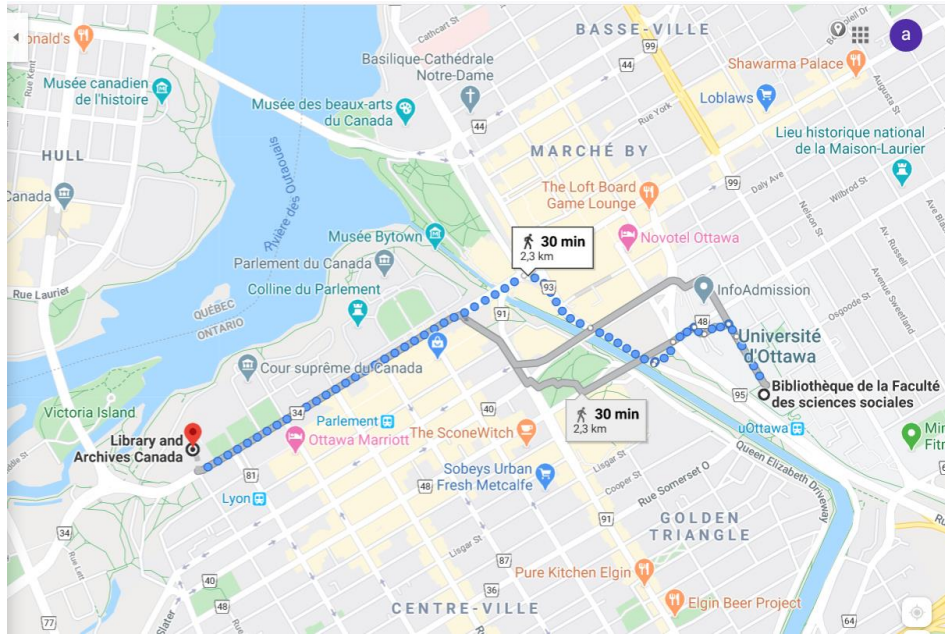

The conference will take place at the FSS Building (green on the map).



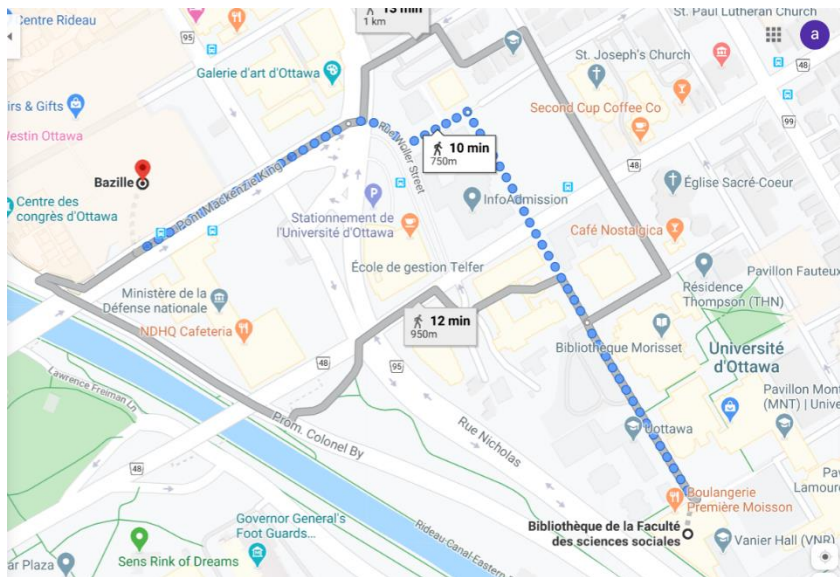
